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State Forecasts 0% State Water Project Allocation; Drought Challenges Continue California Needs to Prepare for Extended Drought, Revaluate Statewide Water Management

Sacramento, CA— The California Department of Water Resources forecasted today that water agencies may not receive any water from the State Water Project in 2014 after the severe drought has led to the worst-ever water supply outlook. Barring a major improvement in water supply conditions, this would be the first time in history that Californians go without water from the State Water Project, which supplies water to 25 million people, businesses and hundreds of thousands of acres of farmland. The announcement underscores the dire water supply situation California is facing and the need for both immediate and long-term solutions.

Below is a statement from Lester Snow, executive director of the California Water Foundation:

"The reality is, this could be just the beginning of a long-term drought, and we need to prepare for that scenario.

"California needs to rethink how we manage water supplies in the state, including expanding local water supplies, increasing stormwater capture, advancing water recycling projects and changing our approach to groundwater management.

"Innovation, collaboration and creativity are going to be critical as we look at water supply solutions going forward. It's not just about water coming out of the tap in our homes--water supply solutions need to be aimed at preserving agriculture, building sustainable cities for generations to come and protecting California's natural resources."
